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FROM THE DIRECTOR

To our Partners and Friends -

On behalf of all of us at NEON, we are pleased to present the 2022 Annual Report. 2022 was a big year for NEON – while we continued to provide our ongoing community services, we also launched new programs and added fantastic new staff members to meet community needs.

In January, we launched the Wellness at Work program, with the goal of addressing workforce burnout and strengthening organizational systems that support workers across the state. This training program includes topics meant to help frontline workers take care of themselves, as well as trainings for supervisors and executives in how to support health and increase effectiveness of their community-based staff. NEON also launched the Community Umbrella Program, to provide fiscal sponsorship support in our region. The Umbrella Program seeks to unlock the potential of community volunteers by providing mentorship, insurance support, and 501(c)3 status to small projects. This lets volunteers work directly on projects rather than focusing on building new organizations and applying to 501(c)3 status. It also lets them apply for foundation grant funds and raise tax-deductible donations for their projects. This program is meant to give equitable access to community resources and programs spearheaded by individuals who are invested in the community they live in.

Both of these new programs seek to further our mission of removing barriers, both for community members and larger systems. In 2023, we plan to continue to strengthen our existing programs, meet our equity goals, and add new ways to support our Eastern Oregon community and Community Health Workers across the state.


TRAINING PROGRAM

NEON's expert staff specialize in providing trainings throughout the state of Oregon, with a focus on those working with rural and socioeconomically disadvantaged populations. The training program is best known for providing 90-hour Community Health Worker (CHW) certification trainings and continuing education to support the rapidly growing workforce of Traditional Health Workers.

In 2022, NEON received a Workforce Development Grant to support the health care work force throughout Oregon who are experiencing compassion fatigue and burnout related to the stress of providing services throughout the Covid-19 pandemic.

Wellness at Work provides continuing education credits for all its training opportunities. Thanks to our partnership with Eastern Oregon University, opportunities for academic credit and academic counseling will be available at no cost. Other partners for this project include Oregon Community Health Worker Association (ORCHWA), COFA Alliance National Network (CANN), and Cornerstone Whole Healthcare (C-WHO).

I have never been in a class with so many diverse backgrounds that actually felt comfortable and safe enough to share their stories. The most valuable thing I will take away from this is the stories and experiences that were shared by my classmates.

PATHWAYS COMMUNITY HUB

NEON's Pathways Community Hub is based on a national Pathways Hub model that NEON tailored specifically for the health needs of rural Eastern Oregon. NEON contracts with partner organizations that employ Community Health Workers (CHWs) who work directly with community members within their homes to help coordinate care, address social determinants of health, and provide linkages to resources they need to improve and maintain their health.

The Pathways Hub serves a 6-county region in Eastern Oregon which includes Baker, Malheur, Morrow, Union, Umatilla, and Wallowa Counties. There are currently four contracted organizations including hospitals, clinics, behavioral health, and social services, with an average of 10-15 active Community Health Workers.

The Pathways Hub has specifically served those with chronic conditions and currently serves individuals at risk for or addicted to opioids, new parents or parents-to-be, and families with young children to help promote wellness in early life.

NEON OUTREACH TO COMMUNITIES



Several amazing CHWs on our team have been working on outreach initiatives to get the word out in our community about services offered through NEON's programs like free health insurance enrollment assistance, COVID vaccine access and resources, and wraparound services to address social determinants of health and a variety of needs.

NEON maintains high visibility throughout the communities we serve by regularly participating in outreach events, distributing printed materials, sharing on social media, and conducting radio and other advertising.

NEON is skilled in providing organizational development assessment, coaching, and training to help organizations develop and reach goals in the areas of strategic planning, diversity, equity and inclusion, compassion fatigue, primary care and behavioral health integration, community health assessments, and other topical areas. This revenue supports NEON's long term sustainability and helps to fill other gaps in programming.

Northeast Oregon Network presented Eastern Oregon University Head Start with a community assessment that uncovered community needs and resources as well as identified community culture and social structures that served as the foundation of the EOUHS strategic plan, provided evidence that EOUHS services are necessary, and was a crucial piece of a successful Federal grant award. The NEON team was professional. EOUHS provided the framework requirements of the assessment, along with a few local requests, and NEON delivered promptly with little assistance from the EOUHS team. I will ask NEON for a proposal for our next Federal grant application.

COMMUNITY UMBRELLA PROGRAM



This year, NEON launched the Community Umbrella Program to support community projects with fiscal sponsorship. A fiscal sponsor is a nonprofit "umbrella" organization whose 501(c)3 status allows small community-based projects to operate as nonprofits without building their own organizational infrastructure, such as an independent board or federal nonprofit status.

Projects in this program include small volunteer-led projects, projects needing sponsorship while they gain independent nonprofit status, and entities who are not nonprofits but would like to implement charitable, community-based programs. Here's a look at the projects currently supported by the NEON Community Umbrella Program:

UNION COUNTY LOCAL COMMUNITY HEALTH PARTNERSHIP (LCHP)

The Union County LCHP is an advisory council to our regional Medicaid payer, EOCCO. This group helps direct Medicaid reinvestment funding to local community projects, supporting 7-9 projects per year. NEON in collaboration with GOBHI provides coordination of this group and fiscally sponsors LCHP-funded programs.

UNION COUNTY WARMING STATION (UCWS)

The Union County Warming station has been funded, shaped and supported with staff hours by NEON and HMUC. The Warming Station is a wintertime emergency overnight shelter that serves up to 25 houseless individuals with nightly shelter, food, and resources navigation. Multiple employees of NEON are on the Warming Station board of directors, volunteer in the evenings and provide meals for the Warming Station.

GROWING COMMUNITY ROOTS (GCR)


Growing Community Roots (GCR) is a community project fiscally sponsored by NEON and supported by LCHP funds, the Grey Foundation, and Ford Family Foundation. GCR conducts a summer farm program for youth with individual education plans aged 8-12 years in Union County to develop positive connections to place, peers, and anchoring adults.

HOUSING MATTERS UNION COUNTY (HMUC)


